MUSINGS

Music Sunday - Join us!

"...the spring sun of the arts forms light out of suffering." These lines are from a poem by Christoph Kuffner, set to music by Ludwig van Beethoven, for his Choral Fantasy, Op. 80. "Reports are numerous regarding the fiasco of the Choral Fantasy, introduced to the world at Vienna's Theater an der Wien (capacity 1,230) on December 22, 1808 as "Improvisation for piano with gradual entrance of the orchestra and finally a choral section and finale." On the same program were the Symphonies Nos. 5 and 6, the Fourth Piano Concerto, an aria, two excerpts from his in-progress Mass in C, and a solo improvisation. Nearly all of the music, including some of the most challenging ever devised by the mind of man, was sight-read at the concert, which lasted from 6:30 to 10:30. According to the composer's piano pupil Ferdinand Ries: 'We experienced the fact that one could easily have too much of a good – and even more, a powerful – thing." (Herbert Glass)

"When the master brought out his orchestral Fantasia with choruses, he arranged with me at the somewhat hurried rehearsal, with wet voice-parts as usual, that the second variation should be played without repeat. In the evening, however, absorbed in his creation, he forgot all about the instructions which he had given, repeated the first part while the orchestra accompanied the second, which sounded not altogether edifying. A trifle too late, the Concertmaster, Unrath, noticed the mistake, looked in surprise at his lost companions, stopped playing and called out dryly: 'Again!' A little displeased, the violinist Anton Wranitzky asked 'With repeats?' 'Yes,' came the answer, and now the thing went straight as a string." (Ignaz von Seyfried) Continued on next page

FROM THE OPERATIONS COUNCIL

FUSN Room Rentals

Do you know that you receive a discount as a FUSN member on the room rental rate when you host an event in our building? What a terrific perk of membership!

Last year the Operations Council reviewed the rental rates and policies, which resulted in more appropriate, yet very reasonable prices, and a clearer way to rent rooms. Regular rates were established based on the size each room, and a separate, minimum cleaning fee per rental was instituted. As shepherds of the building, we aimed to cover the costs of operating (heat, electricity, wear and tear, etc.) our beautiful old structure.

In December 2016, the Ops Council continued to refine the policies and rates for room rentals. A prorated fee structure was approved for members, based on 50% of the regular rate per room. For non-profits, the rate will be 75% of the regular amount.

AN INVITATION

The Catholic Church Opts for Nonviolence over War: What Now? Sunday, Feb 5, 3:00 p.m.

Dr. Lisa Sowle Cahill, professor of theology at Boston College, was one of the leaders of last April's Vatican 3-day international symposium on Nonviolence and Just Peace. The symposium recommended that the Catholic Church drop its teaching of "Just War Theory" and endorse a policy of nonviolence with a teaching from the pope. In response, Pope Francis has just issued a statement for January 1, the World Day of Peace in the Catholic Church, calling for all to embrace a policy of "active nonviolence" and no more war. Dr. Cahill will describe the Vatican symposium and speak on the future of nonviolence in the Catholic Church and the world.

After her presentation there will be discussion with the audience. Sponsored by Newton Dialogues on Peace and War and the Sacred Heart/Our Lady Help of Christians Justice and Peace Committee. This meeting will be in the lower church hall of Our Lady Help of Christians Church at 573 Washington St., Newton Corner. All are welcome.
